



## Permitted Use Agreement

### Developing Manual Handling Skills

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Performing manual handling activities may be linked to serious injuries or disorders. When performing manual handling activities, as with many activities, people may experience occasional discomfort in their arms, shoulders, areas of their back, legs and other parts of their body. If they have, or do, experience symptoms such as recurrent and persistent pain in any muscle group or tendons, pain in the soft tissue around their spine, joint pain or any tingling numbness or burning sensation they should NEVER IGNORE THESE WARNING SIGNS. They should PROMPTLY SEE A QUALIFIED MEDICAL PROFESSIONAL, even if symptoms occur when they are not working. Symptoms such as these can be associated with painful and sometimes permanently disabling injuries or disorders of the nerves, muscles and tendons or other parts of the body. These disorders include discogenic injuries, tendonitis, tenosynovitis, sciatic pain and other conditions.

Whilst researchers are still unable to answer many questions related to manual handling activities and the causation of certain medical conditions and injuries, there is general agreement that many factors may be linked to their occurrence, including: medical and physical condition, overall health, and how a person uses or positions their body during work and other activities. Some Guidelines that may help people work more comfortably and possibly reduce the risk of experiencing such conditions can be found in the training resource package Developing Manual Handling Skills Part 1 : Core Skills for the Workplace. If anyone has questions about how their particular lifestyle, activities or medical or physical condition may be related to conditions that may be associated with manual handling activities they should consult a qualified medical professional.

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
